






The staff at the Central State Fair is very excited to host our

permits, again on a first come, first serve basis.

National Bison Association Offers Free Online Training

Now's your chance to learn how to raise American bison, also known as buffalo. And for free!

The National Bison Association (NBA), in conjunction with the USDA Risk Management Agency (RMA), will offer its new Online Bison Training to anyone interested in raising bison. The free course is aimed at educating both potential and existing bison ranchers the basics of raising the animal. The course is divided into three modules covering the history of the animal and the industry, the basics of managing bison, and how to avert risk in raising bison.

The National Bison Association board of director's recently voted unanimously to offer the course free of charge after a project pilot was offered to a three-state region for the past six months. NBA executive director Dave Carter noted "it's important for us to reach out to the general public and offer farmers and ranchers interested in raising bison a starting point to learn about the industry and what's involved. As consumer demand for deliciously healthy bison meat continues to soar, so does the need for increased supply.'

Through a grant from the USDA RMA St. Paul office, the National Bison Association is targeting both existing and potential bison producers to educate them about bison production and risk management. The bison industry is among the fastest growing sectors in the meat industry, with growth exceeding 20% in 2006 and an estimated 25% increase in demand in 2007.

NBA assistant director, Jim Matheson, said of the project, "We're excited to offer the industry the first-ever online training that busy farmers and ranchers can take in their spare time, at their own pace, without having to travel to a seminar or a workshop." If you have access to the internet and have an interest in learning more about bison, then the course is open to you.

Another huge positive is moving the show to the Event Center at the Central States Fairgrounds. Not only are the pens bigger, but we could get back to having large numbers of show animals. And another HUGE bonus is it will allow us more time for bringing animals in and loading out. I think this has nothing but positive aspects, no matter how one looks at it.

In the very near future, I will be sending letters and emails, making phone calls and for some of you, I will rattle your cage! For years, we beat the GTSS and, although 2007 was not a banner year, I am going to do what I can to bring the animals, the people and the excitement back to the BHBC. We have the chance to be the premiere event in the entire industry and there is no reason why we shouldn't. The DTBA, being the Producers Association, is foundation of what is best for the business. Everyone needs animals that will go to work for them. This is just one of the reasons the BHBC is above and beyond other shows. Another reason is even more simple... the minute you start having show only animals is about 2 minutes and 27 seconds before you just lost your first buyer.

Another issue brought to my attention was the fact that some individuals didn't feel that their animals genetics/bloodlines were advertised enough. Karen sends out, with the entire show and sale package, a form for each producer to compose a short paragraph that the auctioneers read at the time those particular animals sell. Now if this isn't enough, I think the simplest way would be to advertise. This seems so simple to me, you have all year to let the world know how your animals came to be. It is not, in my opinion, the duty of the DTBA to do your advertising for you. Some long time producers do tend to get top dollar for their buffalo. There is a pure and certain truth for this; they have won many trophies, bought top breeding buffalo and continue to win trophies consistently. If they get top dollar for their buffalo, it is purely because they have top quality buffalo and they have paid their dues. Newer producers who want that notoriety need to travel the same path. Take home two or more trophies a year from the BHBC for a few years running and you will be rewarded for you work and diligence.



Annette Smith On The Mend From Accident Earlier This Year

As many of you will recall, around the second week of February, the DTBA office received notice from member Claudia Swanson that another good friend and member, Annette Smith, had been seriously injured in a house explosion on their ranch. Their home and belongings were destroyed in what was determined to be a propane explosion. Annette was in the basement at the time of the explosion and her husband, Claude, was out feeding the buffalo. According to news reports, Claude heard the explosion and saw smoke and immediately headed for the house. Claude went to a neighbor's house for help and with assistance from neighbors, they located Annette in the debris and Claude put her in the pickup and headed down the road to meet the ambulance. She was taken to the hospital in Newcastle and later transferred to the Greeley Burn Center.

The explosion was determined to most likely be a flash explosion from an old heater that Annette had been attempting to light. Annette happened to be at the center of the explosion, which may not seem lucky but it was. The force of the explosion gained strength as it spread out and had she been further out from the blast, the outcome could have been much different.

In the days following the explosion, friends and neighbors helped go through the debris to salvage what they could. They found pictures in fairly good condition, books and even unbroken mirrors. Debris from the house was found 1000 yards to the north and east of the house site.

Just as so many of your always respond when one of our members is in need, this was no different. Annette was so thankful to hear from friends near and far and she asked that we share her thanks to all of you.

Annette and Claude were at the IBC event in Rapid City in late July for a day and she is gaining strength and stamina and looking wonderful. Please continue to keep her and Claude in your thoughts as they continue the long recovery/rebuilding process.

Dear Dakota Territory Friends,

Thank you so much for your concern for us after our home exploded and burned February 2, 2007. Although the house and almost all of our belongings were a total loss, we are so grateful to the Lord that I survived. We are also so thankful for friends and neighbors like you folks who kept me in their prayers, sent cards and gifts and contributions to help us start over. It was so nice of Claudia Swanson and Karen and Jud to keep people posted on our situation.

I spent only 17 days in the Greeley Burn Center, which sure beat their estimate of at least two months when I arrived. We stayed with Claude's sister in Rapid City for about six weeks while I was recovering. (Claude has proven himself to be an excellent burn nurse and a very competent bandage man and physical therapy coach.) We are at home now in a small, but very comfortable trailer house at the ranch. We have the same address, phone number and email address so hope to hear from you. If you are in the area, we are located right alongside the county road now so it isn't even out of your way to stop for coffee.

Just a little over a year ago, Courtney Limpert underwent yet another surgery, a very serious one this time. She had a brain aneurysm and it put her life in danger. During the long and arduous surgery, Courtney suffered a stroke and nearly lost

her fight right then and there. Many of you will recall the email messages that went out for our buffalo family to keep Courtney and her family in prayers and thoughts. It was absolutely amazing how that family responded. So many emails and phone calls were sent to Sandy and Jacki and prayers and well wishes for Courtney...it is truly a testament to the character of the buffalo and the people

around them...when one is in need, the others respond and that's exactly what all of you

did for Courtney.

Being away from home and family and friends was very tough on the Limperts. Courtney's surgery took place in Boston and that's a long way from Harding County, South Dakota. But so many people took the time to send an email or a card and it was so appreciated. Sandy and Jacki both commented time and again how much they appreciated the support and prayers and how amazing it was to see just how many lives Courtney had touched. Through some very dark and trying times, your support meant the world to this family.

As Courtney continued to fight back from the affects of her stroke, she was able to be moved to a hospital in Denver. Through email updates and phone calls, word got around and everyone rallied around Courtney. She continued to improve and gain some much needed strength. There was assistance at the ranch back home so Sandy and Jacki could stay with Courtney during these times. Again, a blessing to have such wonderful family and friends in a time of need. The emails and cards continued and through it all, Jacki kept Courtney updated on how much everyone was pulling for her.

Another milestone was reached when just before Christmas of 2006, Courtney was able to transfer to the hospital in Rapid City. So much closer to home and family and back in familiar surroundings. Another blessing to count. Courtney continued to improve bit by bit. Of course there were setbacks and tenuous moments, but overall, she was making progress and doing a little better each day. She spent Christmas with her family and even had a little buffalo prime rib to celebrate the special day. Her room overflowed with Christmas decorations and gifts from near and far.

Shortly after the first of the year, Courtney was doing well enough to move to the Rehab facility in Rapid City. Another

milestone and another joyous occasion. Shortly before this, a plan had been put in place by several DTBA members to do a fund raiser for Courtney during the Winter Conference. About a dozen large items were donated and auctioned off, including the pick of several breeding bulls and a spot in the 2007 Custer State Park Buffalo Roundup. Others that didn't purchase an auction item just walked by and dropped off a check, not needing or wanting anything in return. Opening their hearts, the people in attendance that special night raised over \$26,000 for Courtney's Medical Fund. It was a truly amazing gift to the family and one that was very much unexpected. If nothing else, DTBA members are great at keeping secrets!

Jacki had shared details about this special night with Courtney when she returned to the rehab facility later that night. Courtney was absolutely touched by what her friends had done. She told her mom she wanted to come to the conference next year and thank everyone in person for what they had done for her. Mom agreed that would be a wonderful thing

to do and the deal was sealed!

Shortly after that, Courtney was released from the rehab facility. She went to Belle Fourche to Grandma Judy and Grandpa Jerry's house where she and Jacki stayed while she continued her rehab as an outpatient. She was doing great and she talked about really going home to the ranch in the very near future. It had been over four months since Courtney had been home.

Another bump cropped up in the road when Courtney became sick not too long after leaving rehab. Sandy and Jacki took her back to the hospital in Rapid City where she was admitted. She became very ill and continued to lose precious ground. Her doctors wanted her to return to the hospital in Denver where they felt she could obtain a better diagnosis of the problems she was encountering. The family returned to Denver and Courtney continued to fight but she lost a little bit of ground with each passing day. On April 1, just a little over a month away from her 18th birthday, Courtney had finally had enough fighting and she left the world surrounded by family and friends.

That email that had the sad news was a hard one to write and send, but once again, the outpouring of love and support was phenomenal. The celebration of Courtney's life was awesome and along with the tears, there was plenty of laughter and Courtney

would not have wanted it any other way.

On behalf of Courtney, Sandy, Jacki and Brodie, the words "Thank You" do not begin to do justice to the support, prayers, love and compassion shown by all of you. There is no other way to express the gratitude for all that was done but to thank you all and to tell you it meant so much to the family and they feel blessed to have such wonderful friends.

Thank you, dear friends. Your actions spoke volumes about the impact that Courtney had in her life. She had that special touch and she literally touched the heart and soul of every person she met. Her shoes may not have been very big, but she has left some huge footprints on this earth.



South Dakota Animal Industry Board Offers Information On Animal IDe

On April 24, I attended a meeting in Pierre, SD with the Animal Industry Board concerning the Premises Program and the Animal ID Program in South Dakota. I was there on behalf of the buffalo producers of South Dakota and the DTBA. Also attending were several different associations, including representatives of the cattle, horse, dairy and elk/deer industries, the South Dakota Brand Board and the South Dakota Livestock Exchange. Many other livestock and industry groups were invited but unable to attend

What is the Premises Registration Program? This program is a way to locate where animals are born, managed, marketed or exhibited. It is a voluntary program that is open to all livestock producers, livestock exchange markets, vet clinics, packing plants, exhibition facilities, rendering plants and any other places animals are moved to and from. It is a seven digit number assigned to each participant and it contains basic contact information such as name, address and telephone number. All of this information is kept confidential and is only accessible by state and USDA animal officials. The system was developed in case of an infectious disease outbreak. It is a way that health officials would be able to track, respond to and contain a serious health threat to livestock in the state.

There were three speakers on the day's agenda, Dr. Susan Reenders, Dr. Dustin Oedekoven and Dr. Sam Holland. Each speaker is a veterinarian for the state of South Dakota and each one spoke about a different aspect of the Premises Program and Animal ID.

Dr. Reenders spoke about the South Dakota Animal Industry Board projects promoting the premises registration, the voluntary NAIS (National Animal Identification System) and the current status of the NAIS. The NAIS is a system that would allow health officials to track, respond and minimize the impact of infectious disease outbreaks in livestock. What came out of the need for an ID system is the Premises Registration program. Some examples of the projects Dr. Reenders spoke about were some of the livestock exchanges that had renovated their working facilities to accommodate individuals registered in the premises program. I believe there are now five facilities that can scan animals that have an electronic ID tag with the individual animal's information. Dr Reenders also talked about workshops with SDSU Cooperative Extension, the SD Certified Beef program, the

Feedlot Electronic ID project, the Cull Swine Tag project and the Market Cull Cow project. Each of these individual projects deal with better identification of animals.

Dr. Dustin Oedekoven spoke about the importance of being able to track sick or suspect animals. He gave an example of an animal that was taken to market and was purchased for processing. During the processing, it was discovered that the animal had indications of Tuberculosis, or TB. This animal only had a bangs tag, which led to as many as 135 people needing to be contacted about possible contact with this one animal. If, on the other hand, this animal had been registered with an identification program, maybe only five people would have needed to be contacted and the situation would have been easier to contain. The NAIS and Premises ID are ways we can protect our livestock industries.

Dr. Sam Holland reiterated the importance of a viable ID system to help not only the state health officials, but also livestock producers and people involved in the livestock/agriculture business.

After the speaker presentations, each person in attendance had the opportunity to discuss their opinions and thoughts about the Premises Program/NAIS. When it was my turn, I expressed my feelings about the need to keep the program voluntary. In addition, being that I am registered in the Premises Program and that my animals are Source Verified with the National Bison Association, I expressed that the cost has to come down. The price of tags and the equipment is too high for most bison producers. There has to be a way to have a cost-share program of some type to help make this a feasible program for most producers.

However, in the meantime, I believe that educating people about the program and letting them know why it is important is the first step. I have requested that a "User's Guide Update" be sent to the DTBA office (it has been received and is available) so that anyone interested would be able to read through it. More information is also available through the South Dakota Animal Industry Board in Pierre. Enclosed in this newsletter is a brochure about the Premises Program. If you do not receive one, let the DTBA know and we'll make sure you receive that information.

If anyone has thoughts, ideas, concerns or needs more information about these topics, please let myself or Karen at the DTBA office know. I believe this is something that needs to be looked at as a way to protect our industry.

Carter Addresses North Dakota Buffalo Association Winter Meeting

On March 19, 2007 I had the honor of being one of the participants in the National Bison Association's Buffalo Industry Marketers Roundtable. Most of the major marketers in North America were there. It is amazing to see how much interest there is in buffalo. I came away from the meeting with a couple of observations.

1. Demand is growing faster than supply.

- 2. Marketers are very aware that producers need more money for their livestock.
 - 3. The public is becoming more aware of buffalo meat.
- 4. The NBA is doing what they can to help the buffalo industry.
- 5. Quality buffalo will become more important with a rising market.
 - 6. Producers are going to be in a more powerful position.

While it is impossible to say when some of these changes will take place, the industry marketers were in agreement that they will take place. The NBA is committed to take this message to the producers of the buffalo industry. On a personal note, I want to commend buffalo producers for doing a great job. It never ceases to amaze me how resilient and resourceful buffalo ranchers are. At times they remind me of the buffalo itself, true survivors.

The NBA had this to say about the Industry Roundtable that Bruce participated in:

Bison industry marketing leaders from the United States and Canada gathered to analyze the long-term market growth trends and to begin mapping a strategy to stimulate new production from bison ranchers.

The meeting was called jointly by the U.S. National Bison Association and the Canadian Bison Association to address growing concern among marketers that consumer demand may begin to outpace the supply of market-ready bison in the near future. The 24 marketers participating in the roundtable discussion this week agreed that several steps are needed to help stimulate production and meet anticipated growth of more than 10 percent annual growth in bison meat consumption.
