Dakota Territory Buffalo Association Bison Burger Recipe:

Mix with one pound of ground bison burger:

1/4 cup of chopped onion.

1/4 cup of chopped green pepper.

1/2 teaspoon of granulated garlic.

1/4 teaspoon of salt.

1/8 teaspoon of hotshot pepper.

Let the mixture stand for 30 minutes. Form 3 burgers and barbecue on the grill at medium temperature for eight minutes on each side. Enjoy!

DTBA 1999 Summer Conference Recap

If you're the kind of person who likes to baha or go fourwheeling through all kinds of terrain, you missed out on a fantastic opportunity if you didn't attend the Dakota Territory Buffalo Association Summer Conference. The conference was held the first weekend in June in Chadron, Nebraska and thanks to mother nature, the ranch tours turned into some

interesting drives.

The conference kicked off with a Friday night social, complete with torrential downpours, tornado sightings and lots of lightening all around the region. But that didn't stop the attendees from talking about their favorite subject, bison. The social put everyone in the right frame of mind for the weekend and introduced several new members to the association.

On Saturday, the DTBA members enjoyed a buffet breakfast and tour guide for the day, Jim Budd filled them in on the day's plans. Jim and his wife, Sharon and their son, Doug, did an outstanding job of revamping plans due to the weather. We piled into the four wheel drives and headed out west of Chadron to the Oglala National Forest where Jim has a herd of buffalo.

Trying to find Jim's buffalo in the hills of the forest was a riot. People bounced around in the backs of pickups and mud was flying around every corner. When we finally did find some buffalo at the top of the hills, you had to look quick as they sprinted off in the other direction just as we arrived. It made for a beautiful tour of the forest and quite an interesting drive to lunch, especially if you were in the group with Jim's son Doug and his son-in-law, Shane Bennett.

We were treated to a spectacular lunch prepared by Sharon and crew. The meal was excellent and the cooks got many thanks from hungry buffalo hunters.

After a tour of Jim's corrals, we were off to the Hudson-Meng Bison Bonebed, but not before Jim told us we had to stop at a place called The Drifter Cookshack. We found the neat little stop and discovered small, wooden buildings filled with antiques along with five cent coffee, lemonade and sasporilla drinks. After some time there, we went on to the bonebed site which was very interesting. Excavations are currently in progress and small portions of the bonebed are uncovered and in the process of being laser photographed and cataloged. After hearing the history of the bonebed, members rounded back up and headed back to Chadron for the evening meal and entertainment.

The entertainment for the evening was cowboy poet and singer Howard Parker from Gordon, NE. His songs and poems brought laughter and smiles to the crowd. That was followed by the DTBA fun auction and the whole show was watching DTBA President Greg Smeenk's son, Jed, entertain. His eyes lit up when someone brought in a huge candy bar and of course, dad couldn't resist and Jed got to take it home. (According to the latest report, he's STILL eating it!) He was bidding on the candy bar as much as dad was. He also managed to model some bison boxer shorts

and the crowd loved it. So did Jed, his grin a mile wide. The auction is a fund raiser for the DTBA, but on that night, twenty percent of the proceeds were donated to fellow bison producer, Dale Dilley, who was again battling cancer.

On Sunday, the group had a short business meeting, discussing a variety of things, including some future plans for the association. It was noted that a big thank you went out to conference organizers, Jim and Sharon Budd and Jerry and Bev Austin. They did an excellent job. Chad Kremer and Dixie Byrd, the Education Committee cochairs, updated members on their efforts, including a possible video production, working with the South Dakota Ag in the Classroom project, and even trying to get on the Agri-Talk radio program, a nationwide radio show.

Roy Liedtke gave an update on the DTBA website, which is now up and running. He also thanked Jacki Limpert for

her part in getting some DTBA promotional items ordered and offered for sale. The items, such as shirts, sweatshirts, can coolers and other items, were all big sellers at the summer conference. Roy also talked about a video production as well as the need for all members to help promote the sales of bison meat.

Just after the meeting was adjourned it began raining, but the group headed out for Fort

Robinson, just west of Crawford, to view that herd and have lunch. The drive was mostly in the rain and the lunch at the corrals was not looking too good at this point.

Jim Lemmon was the host at Fort Robinson and after some more four-wheeling around the buffalo pasture, in the wrong direction of course, we finally arrived back at the main area of the Fort for lunch. We ate in the historic mare barn, where pictures of the Fort's great remount sires and dams graced the walls. Jim explained to the crowd how the herd at Fort Robinson is maintained and managed. Lots of questions were fielded and much of the lunch talk was about how the Fort Robinson herd is managed. After lunch, Jim lead us through the pasture, again a muddy baha, to the corrals. The corral system is very interesting and Jim and two other handlers designed it and have made modifications to it over the years. In his 39 years with the park, Jim has seen many changes, but he admits he stayed on because of the buffalo.

The corral system is a unique set up and many of the producers in the crowd were interested in how it worked. They even got out a tape measure to take measurements, as many of them commented on how they would like to have something similar at home. After driving back through the pastures, the conference came to a close and everyone headed out for home. Attendees were from Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Wyoming and Wisconsin. The next general membership meeting for the DTBA will be the Black Hills Buffalo Classic Show and Sale held in conjunction with the Black Hills Stock Show in January in Rapid City, SD.

Brucellosis Update

A recent United States Animal Health Association newsletter carried a report from South Dakota State Veterinarian, Dr. Sam Holland. The report was on brucellosis in bison and it gave an update on the one remaining herd in South Dakota that was infected with the disease.

Dr. Holland gave a history of the Triple U Buffalo Ranch located in Western South Dakota. For the past 17 years, the herd has been under quarantine and working to control and eventually eradicate brucellosis from its ranks. According to Dr. Holland, this bison herd has been the one thing holding South Dakota back from gaining a free state status. Cattle in the state have been declared free of brucellosis for the past nine years.

With much patience and persistence, the herd has been in a major cleanup status since 1990, when the ranch proprietor contacted Holland to ask if he thought they should start testing their herd. Holland says that call was the beginning of a long-term clean-up program. Initial testing showed the overall infection rate of over 20 percent.

Some of the major players in this eradication effort included reducing the herd size to under 3,000 head, keeping clean groups separate, timely testing, and the use of the RB51 vaccine and boosters. Holland said the most difficult task was keeping the animals separated, which at times required maintaining from eight to twelve separate populations on the ranch.

In early 1999, USDA officials, ranch management and Dr. Holland all signed an agreement to do a partial depopulation over a short time frame. With 2,700 animals being tested and 1,200 testing negative, the depopulation efforts were massive. All of the infected animals were removed from the ranch earlier this year and the remaining animals have tested negative to this point. A herd plan remains in place and testing will continue at 60 day intervals for the next year and a half.

While it took a huge effort from everyone involved, Holland notes that this is a giant step toward moving the clean-up forward and putting to rest a 40-year old chapter in the brucellosis program.

Comments From Jason Sparling, 2000 BHBC Show Chairman

Dear DTBA Membership,

The year 2000 Show and Sale is just around the corner. There are a few changes in the rules and requirements that we would like to point out this year. All of these changes can be found on your entry form as well.

In the Yearling Heifer Class, all the entries will be required to have an open certificate from their veterinarian. With the high dollars these buffalo are bringing, we want the buyers to be confident that their purchases will fit into their program.

Also this year, we will have four judges, two for females and two for males. In the past, the judge's biggest complaint has been the time restrictions. We want to make sure the top placing animals are exactly that, TOP PLACING BUFFALO. With the time restrictions eliminated, judges can spend more time on each class. With the emphasis on top quality animals, we feel that this is an area we should not overlook and are proud to do everything we can to assist in the judge's job.

IMPORTANT: The year 2000 Show and Sale will be requiring a 4-way test. Meaning that all bison must be tested for Tuberculosis, Brucellosis, Anaplasmosis, Blue Tongue and the tests must be NEGATIVE!

There will be no tolerance for undesirable animals. Undesirable animals will be loaded back onto the trailer and the

consignor is responsible for feed and care of said animals. This is a SHOW and Sale, not an average sale. A sifting committee is in place to make these decisions and the decisions are FINAL.

The Dakota Territory Buffalo Association takes a great deal of pride in The Black Hills Buffalo Classic. Every year we strive to make the show better in every way. Since the first show, our quality has steadily improved every year. I believe we owe a great deal of THANKS to you, the PRODUCER. Everyone that has been involved with the development of this show and sale should be very proud of what has been accomplished. I believe our show is one of the top shows in the country and I am honored to be a part of it, and so should you. THANKS!!!

This year, there will be a Rookie of the Year award presented. It will honor a rookie striving for excellence as so many of our producers do every year. The support of the up and coming people in the bison business is important and we are honored to be able to offer this type of award for our 2000 show.

2000 Black Hills Buffalo Classic Terms & Conditions

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

1. Negative Tuberculosis test (caudal fold) on all animals. Test must have been done within 25 days of sale date.

2. Negative Brucellosis test on all animals. Test must have been done within 25 days of sale date.

3. Negative Anaplasmosis test on all animals. Test must have been done within 25 days of sale date.

4. Negative Blue Tongue test on all animals. Test must have been done within 25 days of sale date.

5. ALL females MUST be calfhood vaccinated for Brucellosis. Show tag numbers, metal tag numbers and BV tattoo numbers must correctly coincide on the Health Certificate.

6. ALL animals must be treated with INJECTABLE ivermec. IMPORTANT: Animals coming from south of the southern Wyoming-Nebraska-Iowa borders must be injected within 10 days of the show date. Animals coming from north of these southern borders must be injected within 25 days of the show date.

7. ALL yearling and two-year-old bulls MUST be semen checked and certified fertile. IMPORTANT: Yearling buffalo bulls mature later than beef bulls and are often harder to test. In comparison, a two year old buffalo bull is like testing a one year old beef bull. Make sure your veterinarian knows this!

8. All two year old heifers must be certified at least 90 days pregnant.

9. All yearling heifers must be certified OPEN. IMPORTANT: This is a new rule this year. Our feeling is that the buyers are paying a lot of money for these buffalo and we want these females to fit into their program.

10. Three copies must be furnished with the original health certificate. Separate health certificates are required for each animal. Pens of three can be on one certificate with three copies.

11. Animals WILL NOT be unloaded if the health certificates do not meet ALL of the above requirements. NO EXCEPTIONS. Pregnancy test, semen test, ivermee and mouthing must be written across the bottom of each health certificate with the date and signature of your veterinarian. Keep your test paperwork with you in case it may be needed.

HORNS

Dehorned animals accepted are yearling and two year old heifers ONLY. All others must have either two good horns or broken horns which have fully healed. We will work with you in case of a broken horn while at the show. Severe bleeders cannot enter the sale ring.

EAR TAGS

Show tags, metal vaccine/tag and registration button are the only tags accepted to be in the buffalo's ear. Consignors will be responsible for applying the show tags in the LEFT ear. This must be done before the animals will be allowed to unload. Any animal that shows up with an extra tag will be charged \$50 to take the tag out.

ENTRY LIMITS AND DEADLINES

Twenty (20) head for all classes except two year old bulls. Twelve (12) two year old bulls will be allowed. One (1) head per consignor per class until November 15. If a class is not filled by this date, you will be allowed two (2) head per consignor per class until December 1. Waiting list will apply based on the earliest postal dates. Limits per consignor will be enforced. Limits per class are flexible depending upon overall entries.

CLASSIC PRODUCER AWARD

(Determined on a point system)

Points for Gold, Silver and Bronze awards will be given on a 3-2-1 basis. A Grand Champion will earn one extra point. A Reserve Champion will earn one-half point. In the case of a tie, the producer winning trophies in the most classes will prevail. Example: two silvers and one bronze will beat one gold and one silver, etc. If still tied, a Grand and then Reserve will prevail. In the case of two consignments, only one can be awarded points for the Classic Producer Award.

LIABILITY

1. The consignor assumes all responsibilities in regards to, but not limited to, the above terms and conditions of this show and sale. The DTBA acts only as agents and will assume NO responsibility in the event of injury or death to any animal or for any discrepancy between buyers and consignors.

2. The Judges and/or Show and Sale Committee reserve the right to disqualify and remove any animal from the Show and Sale if the animals appears to be of an undesirable quality or of the wrong age. A chute will also be on hand, the Committee's decisions will be final.

NOTE: The sifting committee will have no tolerance for animals that are undesirable. Any undesirable animals will be loaded back on to the consignor's trailer. It will be the responsibility of the consignor to provide feed and care for his/her animal.





1999 National Bison Association Summer Conference

The banks of the Ohio River provided the backdrop to the 1999 National Bison Association Summer Conference. It was held in Louisville, Kentucky the second week of August and was well worth traveling to attend.

The host farm for the conference, Kentucky Bison Company and Woodland Farm, did an excellent job of taking care of all the details. Steve Wilson, his family and staff outdid themselves and made each attendee feel right at home.

On Wednesday evening, the big event was the Chairmen's Dinner which benefits the National Buffalo Foundation and the Throlson American Bison Foundation. Historic Churchill Downs

was the site of the event and dinner was held in the Kentucky Derby Museum.

Thursday morning found NBA President Del Hensel addressing the general membership meeting. He filled in the audience on a variety of items that are being addressed at this time or are on the agenda for future study and committee reports were given from the various chairpersons.

Humor and history marked the opening speaker, Dr. Ted Franklin Belue. He is a native of Kentucky, a historian, author and scholar with a sense of humor. His presentation on Buffalo in America's First Far West examined the role of buffalo in early America as well as taking a look at how the Native Americans and early settlers lived during that period of time.

Another featured speaker was Allan Nation, the editor or the Stockman Grass Farmer. Allan spoke to the membership on two occasions, once discussing the economics of grass farming and the other presentation was on the marketing of specialty meats.

The Turn 'N Learn sessions offered a variety of topics and presentations. Art and Jane Stewart, owners of Needmore Buffalo Farm in Elizabeth, IN, gave a presentation on their farm and tourist operation. Dr. Gil Myers, an independent consultor and researcher from Magnolia, KY, gave an informative presentation on controlling parasites in a bison herd.

Steve Sarson of Solidlock, USA gave a presentation on fencing and how to get the most out of it. With the economic and tax situations as they are today, many people were interested in the sessions presented by Elizabeth Paris. Her presentation on "Preserving Our Lifestyles For Future Generations" was well attended and very informative.

Joe Brandl of Dubois, WY is the owner of Absaroka Western Designs and Tannery. He presented information on buffalo hide tanning, a guide to the do's and don'ts of tanning a hide. Brandl's sense of humor made the whole presentation as he led the audience through the steps needed to get the hide to the tannery in the best possible condition.

Austin and Jan Moseley of Texas Bison Company gave an overview of their ranch operations. They market their grass-fed bison in the area around their hometown, Caddo Mills, Texas.

Skip Sayers presented an overview of the history and marketing of Sayersbrook Bison Ranch. This Missouri showplace has expanded from a bison ranch all the way to opening a USDA approved processing plant and kitchen.

An orthopedic surgeon gave a presentation on the musculoskeletal form and function of bison. Dr. Marlowe Goble, who is also a bison producer, took a nononsense, practical approach to showing the audience the form and function of the bison.

Half the fun of these conferences are the farm/ranch tours and this year was no exception. On Thursday evening, Robert and Julie Allen of Blue Grass

Bison, opened their farm to all to enjoy a barbecue and tour of their facility. On Saturday, the day was spent at the host farm, Woodland Farm. The Wilson family and the staff of Kentucky Bison Company went all out for the affair, with horse and carriage tours of the farm, tractor tours, fishing tournaments, hiking adventures, Native American activities, craft exhibits, bluegrass music and tours of the farm's historic house as it is being reconstructed to its original splendor.

Next year, the NBA Summer Conference will be held in conjunction with the Canadian Bison Association as they host the International Bison Conference in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada.

The Northern Plains Bison Education Network's (NPBEN) Summer Institute, "Tatanka Studies" was held at Lower Brule on July 22 and 23. Approximately 125 instructors, interns and students from South Dakota, North Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa and

Minnesota were in attendance, including representatives from 10 Tribal Colleges and SDSU, NDSU and ISU.

Activities included a traditional Plains Indian Buffalo Kill Ceremony and butchering demonstration, a brain-tanning demonstration and classroom presentations on the Institute's theme, Returning Harmony to the Land. The diverse group's reaction to the Summer Institute was overwhelmingly positive with the Kill Ceremony, Field Studies and handson experiences being the over-all favorites.

Native Americans felt the Institute touched a cultural nerve and were very appreciative of the


opportunity to participate because of the subject matter and its importance to future generations. Non-Indians, including a group of German exchange students and instructors from Oglala Lakota College, were impressed with the diversity of the group and the

opportunity to understand the Native American views on bison husbandry, holistic resource management and their cultural and spiritual connections to the land and animals. The non-Indian ranchers in attendance were pleasantly surprised to learn that they

share many of the same values and beliefs and were anxious to apply the concepts presented at the Institute.

The NPBEN's Second Annual Summer Institute will be held at Lower Brule and will again be sponsored by Lower Brule Community College. Participants of this year's Institute are already looking forward to the next session. Preliminary plans for the Year 2000 event include an on-site tipi village and evening story-telling activities explaining the role of bison in Native myth and legend, sinew making and other by-product use demonstrations, and programs on public and tribal herd history origins and native plant usage and importance to the ecology.
