Black Hills Buffalo Classic Show and Sale Entries Now Open

Gone Wild challenge classes have been the key to keeping our show and sale vibrant and a destination for buyers.

Consignors in last year's Young Guns class enjoyed the highest average in the country on their yearling bull entries, with an average of \$5,390 per head. The high selling bull at last year's show and sale was the Reserve Grand Champion, a Young Guns bull, that brought \$9,500. In 2012, the Reserve Grand Champion was also a Young Guns bull that brought the second highest price that year, \$7,000. In 2011, our highest selling bull was...you guessed it, a Young Guns bull that was named Grand Champion and brought \$16,500 at the auction.

The Girlz Gone Wild two year old bred heifers fared pretty well in their inaugural debut last year, with the class average being \$3,248. The Grand and Reserve Champion Females both came out of this class, with the Grand Champion bringing \$6,000 and the Reserve Grand Champion garnering a final bid of \$6,400 at the auction.

So, as you can see from those averages and high prices, our Young Guns and Girlz Gone Wild classes can certainly make for a nice paycheck, not to mention the excellent exposure and marketing it can bring your operation. Imagine one of your homegrown heifers being named the winner of the Girlz Gone Wild class and then topping the market during the auction. Not too bad of a return on your investment.

If you are entering other animals in the calf or yearling heifer classes at the Black Hills Buffalo Classic, you can also benefit from the increased interest the challenge classes bring to our show and sale. More buyers in the seats on auction day means more competitive bidding for every animal that goes through the sale ring. We have been very fortunate over the years to have some of the best calves and yearling heifers in the country go through our show and sale and participation in these classes has been steady and we want to continue to offer this marketing tool to our consignors who have supported these classes. Our auction

averages on the calf classes is typically at or near the top of the year-end averages.

Another great marketing tool is The Cutting Edge Carcass Contest. What a great way to showcase your operation from start to finish by putting your money where your customer's mouths are! The carcass contest is reality-based and we have a number of consignors who come back year after year as a way of proving and improving their breeding programs based on the contest results. In this meat-based industry, this contest is a great tool to showcase your production herd and what it can do.



Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) Being Noted In Bison

The article below is an excerpt from the South Dakota Extension Newsletter. I believe that I had three cases of EHD this year. One was my nine year old bull that I will sorely miss. Infected white tail and the midges or gnats seem to be prolific this year on the west side of Montana. I have culled another animal that was showing the beginning symptoms of EHD.

From the December 2012 SD Extension Newsletter:

Of the many case submissions investigated by the SDSU ADRDL during the EHD outbreak, possibly the ones of most interest involved three separate bison herds. Very little is described in the literature when it comes to natural or experimental infections of bison with EHD virus; likewise, there is little precedent for ascribing diagnoses to these cases. All three bison submissions were from animals that died; significant post-mortem lesions were present in all cases, although none of them were reported to have oral lesions such as those that were commonly noted in cows.


Bison case #1 came from Yankton County, an area of many reported cattle EHD infections. In late September, two animals died from this herd of approximately 20 bison. A bull had been found dead; shortly after that a bison cow that had been acting slow and lethargic for the past 3-4 days died. The veterinarian's post-mortem examination revealed very large paint-brush hemorrhages on the surface of the rumen, hemorrhagic enteritis, and hemorrhages within the kidneys. A PCR test performed on spleen from the animal was positive for EHD virus serotype 2, and negative for bluetongue and malignant catarrhal fever. These were the only two animals affected in the herd; no other animals showed any clinical signs.

Bison case #2 was located in southern Union County near the Missouri River. A herd of 20-25 bison was grazing wooded pasture adjacent to the river. The producer lost 2 bison cows in a short period of time, and approximately a week later, a bull was found dead. No obvious clinical signs were noted except for lethargy just


amount of bloody diarrhea as well as hemorrhagic intestinal contents. The kidneys were a dark gunmetal color with much congestion. The pathology report noted a severe segmental hemorrhagic enteritis and hemorrhage and necrosis in the kidney. A clostridial organism was isolated from the intestines, which was of unknown significance. No other signs were noted in the rest of the bison herd, although many dead white-tailed deer were noted in the area. Bison case #3 was one of only a handful of submissions that came from West River. This herd of approximately 80, 100 bison

prior to death. In the bull, the referring veterinarian noted a large

Bison case #3 was one of only a handful of submissions that came from West River. This herd of approximately 80-100 bison was located in eastern Custer County. Four head of bison died over the course of 4-5 days in early October. The referring veterinarian found a thickened duodenum, congested spleen, and hemorrhages in the omasum and small intestine. Histopath revealed severe necrohemorrhagic enteritis and omasitis, with some indication of peritonitis. Clostridium perfringens organisms were also isolated from the intestine. PCR on the spleen was positive for EHD virus and negative for bluetongue virus. One lame animal and another animal "acting slow" were treated by the owner, but no other significant problems were noted in this herd besides the death losses.








Mycoplasma Vaccine Now Available For Buffalo

Turner Enterprises, Inc. worked with Newport Labs to develop a vaccine for mycoplasma to protect the 55,000 bison on Turner ranches.

We previously suffered losses of up to 20% of several breeding herds with Mycoplasma becoming a primary pathogen. Canada has had similar losses in breeding herds in Alberta and Manitoba.

We had saved samples from all the mycoplasma losses since 2000 on Turner ranches and found only two strains caused disease in the bison. The bacterin (killed organism) was developed from these strains. It has now been given to the entire herd for two years and appears safe for use in pregnant bison and calves. The Turner ranches have not lost bison to mycoplasma since the initiation of the vaccination program. No vaccine is 100% effective against disease, but mycoplasma has not been a primary pathogen on the bison since the vaccination program was initiated.

In working with Newport Laboratories and the Food and Drug Administration we are now able to offer this vaccine for use in all bison herds. These herds will be classified as "non-adjacent" bison herds. We are working with the National Bison Association to inform producers of the availability of this vaccine.

• The veterinarian will then pay Newport Laboratories directly at the rate of \$0.71/dose, and will bill the rancher accordingly.

The vaccine will be available in mid-summer.

USDA Publishes Emerging Disease Notice on Mycoplasma Bovis

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) has published an emerging disease notice on Mycoplasma bovis (M. bovis), a bacterial pathogen that recently became a major concern in the North American commercial bison industry. APHIS's Center for Epidemiology and Animal Health (CEAH) produced the 6-page report, Mycoplasma Bovis - An Emerging Pathogen in

Ranched Bison, in October 2013.

In bison, M. bovis seems to be a primary pathogen, causing disease in feedlots and in breeding-age cows on pasture. Mortality rates in adult bison have been as high as 25 percent, causing significant economic losses to producers. Because Mycoplasmas do not produce toxins like other pneumonia-causing pathogens, affected animals remain alert early in the disease but often trail behind the herd due to exercise intolerance. The chronic nature of Mycoplasma bovis disease in bison eventually leads to emaciation and weakness. Affected bison are often euthanized.

This 6-page emerging disease notice describes the clinical presentation of Mycoplasma bovis in bison; gives examples of diagnostic procedures and tests to detect M. bovis; provides a clinical case definition; hypothesizes reservoirs and transmission pathways; suggests treatment and prevention options; discusses economic and animal welfare consequences; and explores future directions for research and effective treatment and prevention strategies.



Rapid City, SD -- The Rancher Relief Fund is now accepting applications for assistance from livestock producers impacted by the blizzard.

Representatives of the Rancher Relief Fund founding livestock organizations identified dual priorities for fund distribution — assist those who were hardest hit first and provide financial assistance to as many producers as possible. Based on these priorities, funds will be distributed through the SD Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (SDVOAD), which is comprised of a number of disaster relief organizations.
